


Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

The First Reading Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16


Reader A reading from Genesis.

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you. The Second Reading Romans 4:13-25

Reader A reading from Romans.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

The Gospel Mark 8:31-38

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." The Sermon

A brief silence follows.

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. 



"The Episcopal Awakening", a short film created by the Indianapolis chapter of the Union of Black Episcopalians (UBE) at our recent Diocesan Convention. The film offers a number of reflections from members of the Diocese along with important local Episcopal history. The film reminds us that it is one thing to think about the distant past or far off places. But when we realize that our own communities and even our own churches share concretely in this history, it has a particularly profound effect. We are not simply correcting for some abstract wrong done to "other people", we are correcting wrongs done to the people who have sat in the pews with us and maybe still do. At the same time, we also share in stories of resilience and repair that give us examples and models of how to be the Church, the Body of Christ, in its truest form. As the film states toward the end, "Events of the recent past have shown us that there is still much work to do to heal our culture of racism. This journey... remains a work in progress."

On Friday, March 8th at 7 p.m., Mother Andrea Arsene, Rector of All Saints, Indianapolis and former Curate at St. John's, will join us to screen the film and talk about local stories of struggle and resilience, of wrong and repair.
