From the Rector

I often hear the complaint that the Church should avoid politics and stick to the Gospel (or some variant of that complaint). I'm sometimes tempted to agree with that sentiment, but in the end, I think it's wrongheaded. Sometimes, to be sure, when people say the Church should avoid politics, they mean the Church should avoid talking about politics with which they disagree. Also, we have come to confuse politics — the way we order society, the priorities we share, our vision of the common good — with partisan politics. If that's what is meant by the claim that the Church shouldn't be political, then I mostly agree. Political parties are too often concerned with their own institutional power rather than that shared vision of the common good.

But while I agree that the Church should not be partisan (and not only because it might affect our tax status), I also think it is clear that the Church cannot avoid being political. Think for a second about Scripture; it is overtly political. The Passover story is all about national liberation from a tyrant and his oppressive policies. Virtually all of the prophets criticized the ruling elites and the people who supported them for their treatment of the poor and their entangling alliances with foreign nations. In the New Testament, Jesus was asked about paying taxes to Caesar, referred to Herod as a "jackal," healed a man possessed by a "legion" (the name for a Roman military division), and was crucified by the state as a "king." Both Paul and the writer of Revelation offer biting critiques of the Roman Empire — the ruling political institution of their day. The early Christian claim that "Jesus is Lord" is both a theological claim and an overtly political one. If these don't sound political, that's because we've become too accustomed to separating the political and the spiritual in a way foreign to the ancient writers of Scripture.

The fact is, most of what we do is political whether we realize it or not. Sharing communion together is a political act. Offering a bag of groceries is a form of solidarity with the poor. Some of the other work we get into from time to time may seem more obviously political — anti-racism work, the gay pride parade and OutFest, letter writing campaigns advocating for funding to address food insecurity, rallies to defend our immigrant sisters and brothers from inhumane treatment. But we must ask ourselves: How can we proclaim the Gospel — how can we share the good news of God's love — without responding when people are hungry, imprisoned unjustly, denied basic human dignity and so on? How can we live out our baptismal covenant — how can we seek and serve Christ in all persons — without being political?

There is no real way to be true to the Gospel — true to the claims of Jesus' Lordship, to the claims that all people are created in the image of God and deserving of God's love and our compassion —without critiquing particular leaders, particular parties, or particular policies. How could we not? If we believe that every person is a child of God created in God's image, for instance, how can we not criticize President Trump for his acerbic language aimed at immigrants or people of color? (I commend the recent statement, "Have We No Decency?", by the Bishop of Washington and the Dean and Canon theologian of the National Cathedral to you.) While the Church should avoid being partisan, this is a difficult line to walk. It is especially difficult since certain policies and personalities are linked to certain parties. And yet, personalities and parties should not keep us from fulfilling our baptismal vows.

Of course it's true, the Church (the whole Church, the Episcopal Church, or St. John's and its leaders) will not always choose the right side of a particular issue. Each of us would do well to be thoughtful, careful and humble. And each of us must follow the dictates of our conscience, a conscience formed by our relationships with God and one another.

We live in divisive times. Now more than ever, Christian community can be a sacrament — a sign of God's grace and the means of that same grace — in the world. As baptized Christians, we are called to proclaim the good news of God's love. I believe that that good news will sometimes require us to hold our political leaders to account, to demand that they change course, and to advocate for those in need. To do anything less would be to shirk our Christian duty. — Bradley+, bradleypace@stjohns-laf.org

It is good news because it was an inspired choice on the Bishop's part; it is what God is calling us to do. I am sure you will join me in wishing Hilary and her family well and supporting her in this new ministry. I look forward to what God and our church communities can do together to share God's love in Greater Lafayette and beyond.

We will have time to honor Hilary and her family and to thank her for her ministry with us. Hilary's last Sunday at St. John's will be Sunday, Sept. 29. If you would like to contribute to a gift in her honor, please make a donation to St. John's "for Hilary." I will be in touch about additional plans for her leave-taking soon. In the meantime, please keep her, her family and the people of Good Shepherd in your prayers.

While we obviously cannot replace Hilary's presence at St. John's, the other staff and leadership are capable and ready to continue strengthening and expanding our ministries together. The Diocese is already prepared to help St. John's identify an interim associate while we discern the future of our ministries. We will keep you informed of any staff changes.

September Book Group: *The Odyssey* by Homer, translated by Emily Wilson 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 26 St. John's Commons

In this new translation of *The Odyssey*, the first ever by a woman, Emily Wilson presents us with a readable, fast-moving version of Homer's epic poem. We follow Odysseus' adventures during his 10-year-journey home after the Trojan War, a journey takes him to the island of the witch Circe, the cave of the Cyclops, down into the Underworld, past the Sirens and through the dangerous channel between Scylla and Charybdis. All his men perish during the journey, but Odysseus finally reaches his home in Ithaca and reclaims both his estate and his wife.

We are going to focus on Books 1, 9-12, 16, 19 and 23, but I do hope you will be drawn into the poem and want to read more. Wilson has given us a volume with an amazing amount of supplementary material that can be helpful as we follow Odysseus' journey. The notes section at the back contains a summary of each book of *The Odyssey*. A useful glossary of proper names follows the notes.

In the words of Emily Wilson, "the poem is concerned, above all, with the duties and dangers involved in welcoming foreigners into one's home," surely a subject relevant to us today. Join us on Sept. 26 in the Commons for a lively discussion of this work. All are welcome.

Since *The Odyssey* is the "One Great Read" for 2019, there will also be activities at the local libraries and Purdue, starting with the kick-off event at the West Lafayette Library Sept. 5. — *Barbara Penney, barbara_penney@yahoo.com*
