From the Rector

On My first Sunday back from sabbatical (and Mother Andrea's last at St. John's), I had the opportunity to preach on a couple of my favorite parables in the Gospels. While preparing, I immediately thought of my own parables. Jesus asked those gathered, "Which of you, having a wonderful church community and a job you love, when offered 3 months off to go to baseball games, wouldn't take the money and run? Which of you," he asked again, "looking in the spam folder of your email and finding a message from someone in California inquiring about being your curate, wouldn't call the vestry and celebrate? And which one of you, upon hearing from her references that she is 'probably only available because of the pandemic' and a saint to boot, wouldn't hire her sight-unseen and thank your lucky stars?" (You may not know that I found an email from Mother Andrea inquiring about the position as Curate at St. John's in my spam folder a week or so after she had sent it. I was absolutely beside myself.)

I am so glad to be back with you. I had a great time on sabbatical, but I have missed everyone at St. John's terribly. I gave you a brief update during the middle of my sabbatical just to say "hello" and let you know how things were going. The highlight of the second half of my time away was our family's trip to California. We spent nearly three weeks in San Diego, Anaheim, and San Francisco. The trip was packed: kayaking with leopard sharks in La Jolla; baseball games in San Diego, Anaheim, Los Angeles, Oakland, and San Francisco (I even caught a foul ball); Warner Brothers' Studio; the Home Run Derby at Dodgers' Stadium (and spending \$250 on an Uber back to our Air BnB); hitting the touristy spots in Los Angeles and San Francisco; hiking along the coast near Pacifica and in Muir Woods; and that amazing drive along California Route 1. We were constantly on the move, but we also found time for rest. If I'm honest, the most memorable part of the trip was getting robbed in San Francisco and having our connecting flight cancelled. Neither event was as traumatic or exciting as you might think. But we were glad to get home.

I spent some time reading this summer. For years, I've been worried especially about the political polarization in our country, so I read some political philosophy looking for insight. You'll be sorry to know, I'm sure (but likely not surprised) that I didn't figure anything out. I also read and reread my ordination vows trying to reconnect to my vocation as a priest. This was helpful, too, as sometimes it's easy to get buried in the weeds and forget why I do what I do (or, to put it differently, to forget what God is calling me to do). I imagine we all feel this way from time to time (whether we're recently retired, buried under loads of work in graduate school, renegotiating life with young children, or whatever). I'm not sure I made any great strides here either, but so much of this kind of discernment is done in community. (More about that in coming months.)

That may be the one thing that was made most plain to me during my sabbatical—I need community. I missed you by face and name. But I missed being in community with you. I missed worshiping with you, studying and serving with you, leading and caring for others with you. I look forward to getting back to all

those things, and I look forward to seeing each of you. That said, if you have time, please reach out to me about getting lunch, coffee, or the like. I'd love to catch up and share stories. Along with breaking bread with you on Sunday, it would be the best way for me to reconnect with you and the body of Christ at St. John's. – *Bradley Pace, bradleypace@stjohns-laf.org*











From the Curate

I've mentioned my years in public education several times already in sermons, articles and conversations during coffee hour. Nevertheless, I'd like to share a bit more of my experience and to consider the importance of public education from a Christian perspective now that the school year is in full swing. My father is a career public educator. His work teaching photography, videography, graphic design and offset printing for 37 years allowed hundreds of students to acquire skills they needed to find rewarding jobs that provided a good living. It also provided our family with a stable life of reasonable comfort. I even had the pleasure of taking his class my senior year of high school. This gave me the chance to learn both skills, and how to teach them, from him.

Dad's teaching certainly inspired me to become a teacher. I was also nudged toward education by two of my Spanish teachers, one in high school and the other in my undergraduate work. They helped me fall in love with the language, history and culture of Spanish, and they made me want to share that love with other people. I began to work in education during the summers between college classes even before I officially entered the secondary education program. Through the Indiana Department of Education, I worked with the children of migrant farm workers in rural central Indiana. My Spanish improved dramatically, and I was exposed to the challenging life of migratory agriculture workers. All these experiences prepared me to work in a community whose population grew from 10 percent Latin@ (this symbol contains both masculine and feminine grammatical possibilities) to nearly 50 percent by the time I left teaching last May.

In addition to filling my heart with a call to preside at Holy Eucharist and to preach, God used the damaging things that happened to public teachers and to public education policy and funding during the last decade to facilitate my exit from the profession. With the alleged accountability measures for teachers came

the scapegoating of public schools. The attacks on teacher bargaining rights and changes in how teachers were paid produced wage stagnation. Many of my colleagues were forced to take on second and even third jobs to keep their bills paid and their families fed. I did my part to work for change as president of my local teachers association for seven years. We had some success, but I was grateful for the plan to move from teaching verb tenses to preaching the Gospel that God had set in motion.

My being a teacher at Frankfort High School for 27 years is not the only reason I am such a robust supporter of public education. My belief in the institution is bolstered by my faith. In Matthew chapter 25, Jesus explains that each time we care for "the least of these" we are also caring for and honoring him. He speaks of that care in the forms of feeding, clothing and providing health care. Educating all of God's children is a special form of caring for people in need because it can be the gateway to a livelihood that provides stability and the possibility of growth. Teaching our children about the world is a crucial way that we care for them. Without quality education we would all be at a disadvantage. Educated critical thinkers are more completely enabled to promote justice, peace and the dignity of all people. All people are valuable, loved by God, and worthy of care, but education helps us all to flourish.

Given its importance, I believe we should advocate for public education. We can do so by encouraging the students and teachers we know, using our agency to influence education policy and support pro-public education politicians and praying for God's blessing on the whole undertaking of education. I would encourage you to check in with the teachers and professors you know. The difficulties that arose during the height of the pandemic are lingering, and they are still challenged to overcome them. Talk with your children and other students you know about how their classes are going. Knowing that people genuinely care about their progress can inspire

students to do their best. Contact politicians at all levels to urge them to support policies and legislation that truly benefit public education. There are members of all parties who care deeply about this

issue. Finally, in addition to these actions, we should pray for everyone involved in public education.

After the sermon, the presider will bless oil to be used for anointing during those services as well as during services throughout the year at St. John's.
