Youth Confirmation Class

Confirmation is a sacrament of the Church — it is a chance for those making a mature commitment to the Christian faith and life to be strengthened by the Holy Spirit toward that work. With that in mind, Hilary and I have been thinking through our Confirmation program to include more than just meeting for classes. We hope to help confirmands begin the lifelong process of living out the Baptismal Covenant and the Church's mission. The Confirmation program is geared toward students beginning the 9th or 10th grade and will take place over the course of about two years. That will give confirmands time to build community, develop mentoring relationships with other members of St. John's, be involved in ministries within St. John's and the wider Church, and grow together as Christians.

Of course, we also want to educate our confirmands in the Christian faith and how we live out that faith in the Episcopal Church. We will spend time learning about the core parts of the faith and the traditions of our denomination including Christian history, Scripture, and worship. Much of the curriculum will be based on the promises in the Baptismal Covenant: promises to learn the teachings of the Church, to worship in community, to resist evil, to proclaim the Gospel, to serve Christ in all people, and to seek justice.

But we know that our youth have busy lives and difficult schedules. So, in order to work out some of the scheduling details, Hilary and I would like to meet with prospective confirmands and parents on **Tuesday August 12, at 7 p.m.**, at St. John's. If you are interested in the Confirmation program, but are unable to attend this meeting, please let us know as soon as possible and we will try to set up another time to meet. From the Rector

Anglicanism has a big heart. And while this may prove to be its downfall, let's give it the benefit of the doubt and say our dear old mum has wide open arms and a voluminous cozy bosom. She's always lovely to come home to, because the kettle's always on, and she never starts off with an interrogation as to where on earth we've been for the last ten years. It's love first, questions later. All this makes for a very untidy house...for there's always someone coming or going in this free and easy environment, and people loitering with good intent. (Richard Giles, Always Open, chapter 12)

My favorite description of membership in the Episcopal Church is "loitering with intent." This is the description of our attitude toward membership from the Very Rev. Richard Giles, former Dean of Philadelphia Episcopal Cathedral and author of *Always Open: Being Anglican Today*. (In case you didn't know, Anglicanism is the worldwide Church Communion of which the Episcopal Church is a rather small part). Giles is British and more often than not his British sensibilities stand out in his description of the Church's life. Still his description is as true here as it is there. In general, our attitude toward membership looks a lot like "loitering with intent." If one of the clergy get hold of your email address or, God forbid, your home address and phone number, you'll end up on the mailing lists, be asked to serve on a committee, and maybe even get a birthday card from the Rector. If not, once we get to know you, we'll think of you as part of the gang even if your name never shows up in the official records.

The fact is, no one at St. John's is going to compel you into anything (well, not anyone in an official capacity anyway). That's not how we work. Even belief isn't a requirement. Whereas some churches or denominations insist that you believe first, learn to behave second, and only then are you invited to belong; in the Episcopal Church, it works differently. First you belong the moment you walk in the door; secondly, if you give us a chance, we'll teach you how to behave (so when am I supposed to cross myself anyway?); and lastly, we hope you'll come to believe in this wild and powerful God we love and proclaim. Instead of compelling folks into membership, Giles says, "we aim to create the kind of local Christian community in which you will want to do more, because you are known and valued, and your gifts recognized. Once you have decided to jump in with both feet, you have real scope for effective Christian service and for influencing the Church's way ahead." If you've come to St. John's long enough to get the Eagle (or we somehow figured out your mailing address;-)), then we hope that you have found St. John's to be just that, the kind of Christian community that calls you into a deeper relationship with that same wild and powerful God we proclaim.

All that being said, membership, official membership, says something about your level of commitment and it says something about who the local Christian community, this local Christian community in particular, can call on when ministry needs to happen. And there are institutional/official ways of making that happen.

- If you came to St. John's from another Episcopal Church or from several other similar denominations, you can become a member by filling out a "**Transfer of Membership**" form. You can get that at the church office
- You can attend one of the Newcomers' Classes and learn all about the Episcopal Church's history; the way we view Scripture, tradition, and reason, and come to appreciate our ethos. Classes take place in the fall (late September-early October) and in the Spring (beginning at the start of Lent). For the record, along with getting to know others who are new to St. John's, the class usually ends with BBQ at my house. That's always a good thing.
- If you are new to the Christian faith, you can be baptized and confirmed in the Episcopal Church, records of which will be kept in the St. John's registry.

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These are the official ways to become members. Why does this matter? At the end of the day, joining an institution is not really the point, nor should we take the rules too seriously (please don't tell the Bishop I said that). Instead, to quote Richard Giles again, "the Church is absolutely essential, not as a divinely appointed institution but as *a place to be*. And the place is not a building, but an assembly of faith, gathered every Sunday, where you hang out with Jesus and his crowd, catching into ideas and visions which are liable to get you in trouble."

If you have found St. John's to be a Christian community where you can worship God, where you find welcome and inspiration, and where you find the inspiration to serve God's Kingdom, consider becoming an official member. Membership shows your commitment to this community and to our mission of worshiping God made known in Christ, of sharing God's love, and to making Christ known in our community and to future generations.

Book Group to discuss 'The Goldfinch'

We start our 2014-2015 season with The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt. This book won the 2014 Pulitzer Prize for fiction and has been on the NY Times best-seller list for over 30 weeks. Here is the description from the Pulitzer Prize website:

"A beautifully written coming-of-age novel with exquisitely drawn characters that follows a grieving boy's entanglement with a small famous painting that has eluded destruction, a book that stimulates the mind and touches the heart."

The Goldfinch is one very long book, at least by contemporary expectations, and this has led me to musing about long books in general. There are many of them even longer than The Goldfinch – including War and Peace, Anna Karenina, David Copperfield, Martin Chuzzlewit, and Quiet flows the Don. I'm sure there are more.

So, I have wondered: Does an author really need to go on for so long? (Dickens needed to for a while – he was paid by the word.) What is gained from such length? What would be lost if the book were abridged? What are your thoughts and reactions? Jane Austen is quoted as saying, "If a book is well written, I always find it too short." What would Jane think of The Goldfinch?

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The Wisdom of the Enneagram – a Quiet Day Workshop on September 13

Heidi Kauffman will facilitate an Enneagram workshop from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, September 13. Your \$25 registration fee, due Monday September 8, includes your own copy of the book, "The Wisdom of the Enneagram," lunch, and a donation to St. John's Outreach efforts. Complete a registration form in the Commons and deliver it with payment to the church office.

The Enneagram (pronounced any-a-gram) is a description of 9 personality types. Each type has its own lens to view the world and a dominant strategy for how it relates to the world. Each type has gifts and wisdom to contribute to the world.

The Enneagram is not a personality test that "puts you in a box." It does not show who you are but it will help you identify the patterns that dominate your experience and your relationships. Learning about what motivates you and other personality types may aid in greater compassion, understanding, and harmony within yourself and your relationships.

The Enneagram has been used by people globally of all faiths. It is not a religion; rather it is a useful tool for spiritual direction and transformation. It has been used by spiritual directors and teachers of many faith traditions.

This workshop will introduce you to the structure and basics of the Enneagram and how it is useful as a tool for transformation.


Participants will:

- * Receive your own book and a handout of resources

Heidi was introduced to the Enneagram 20 years ago when her small group at church listened to Fr. Richard Rohr, OSF, teaching about the Enneagram. Since 2006 she has studied the Enneagram intensively with a book group that meets weekly.
